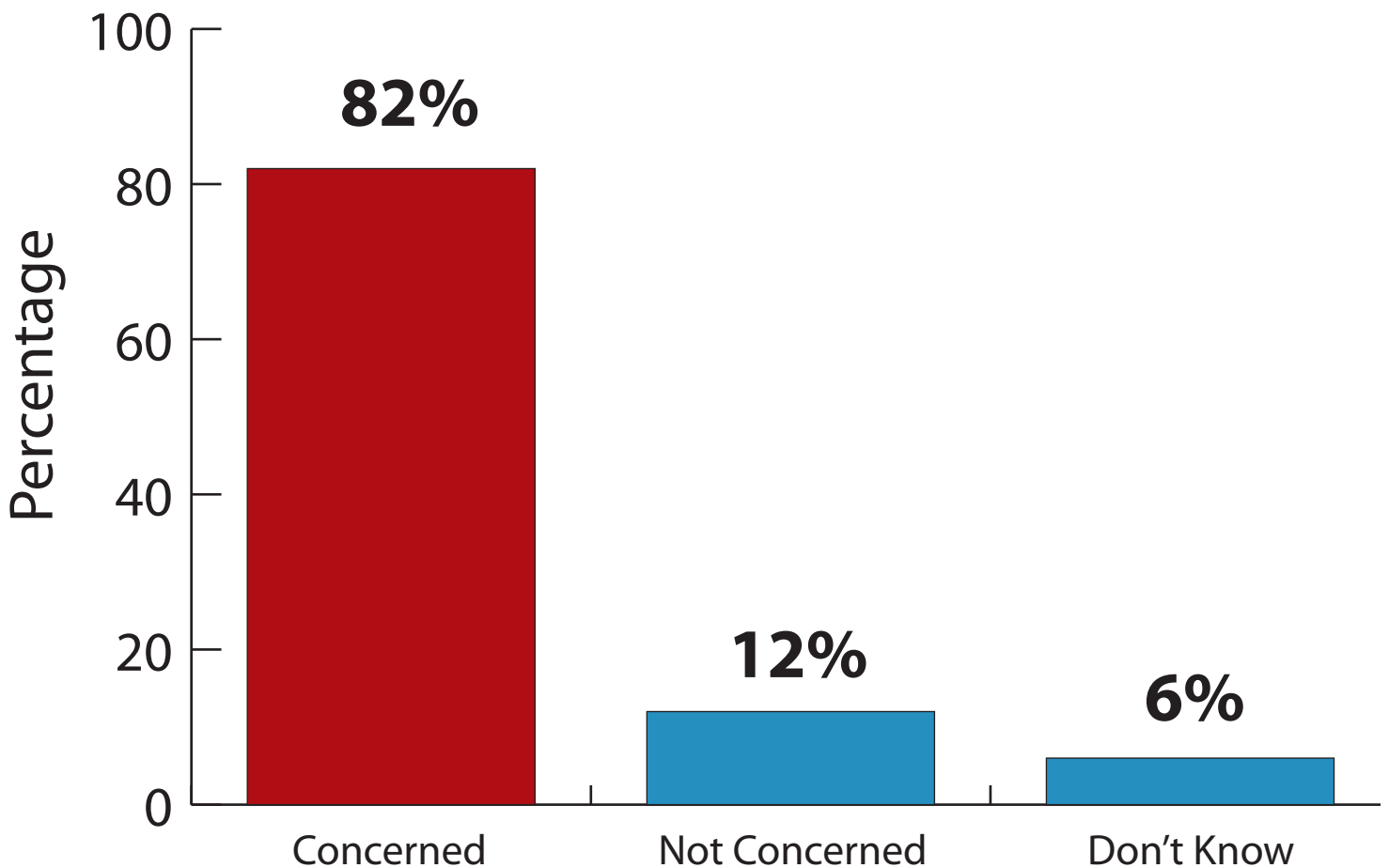


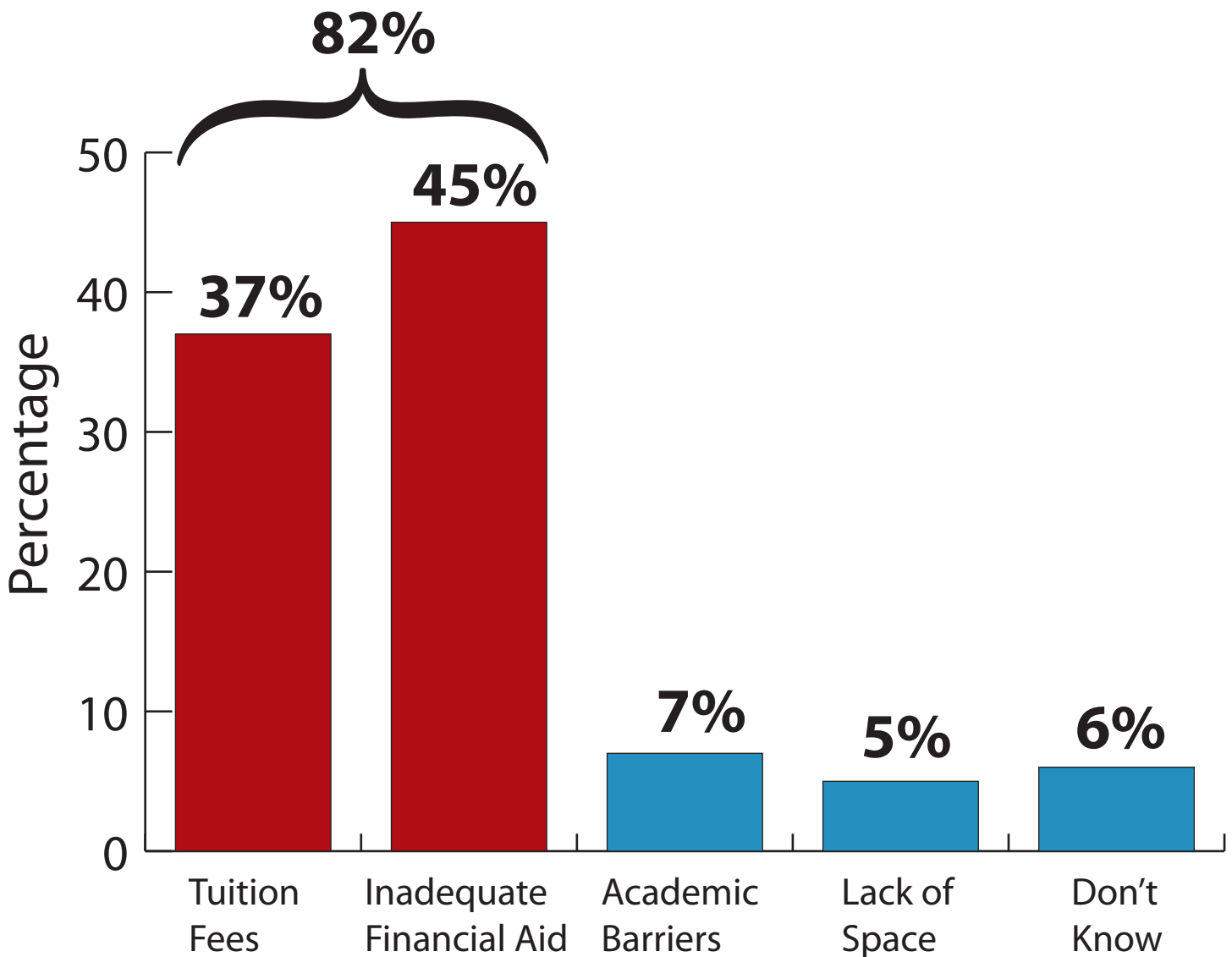
# Access to PSE

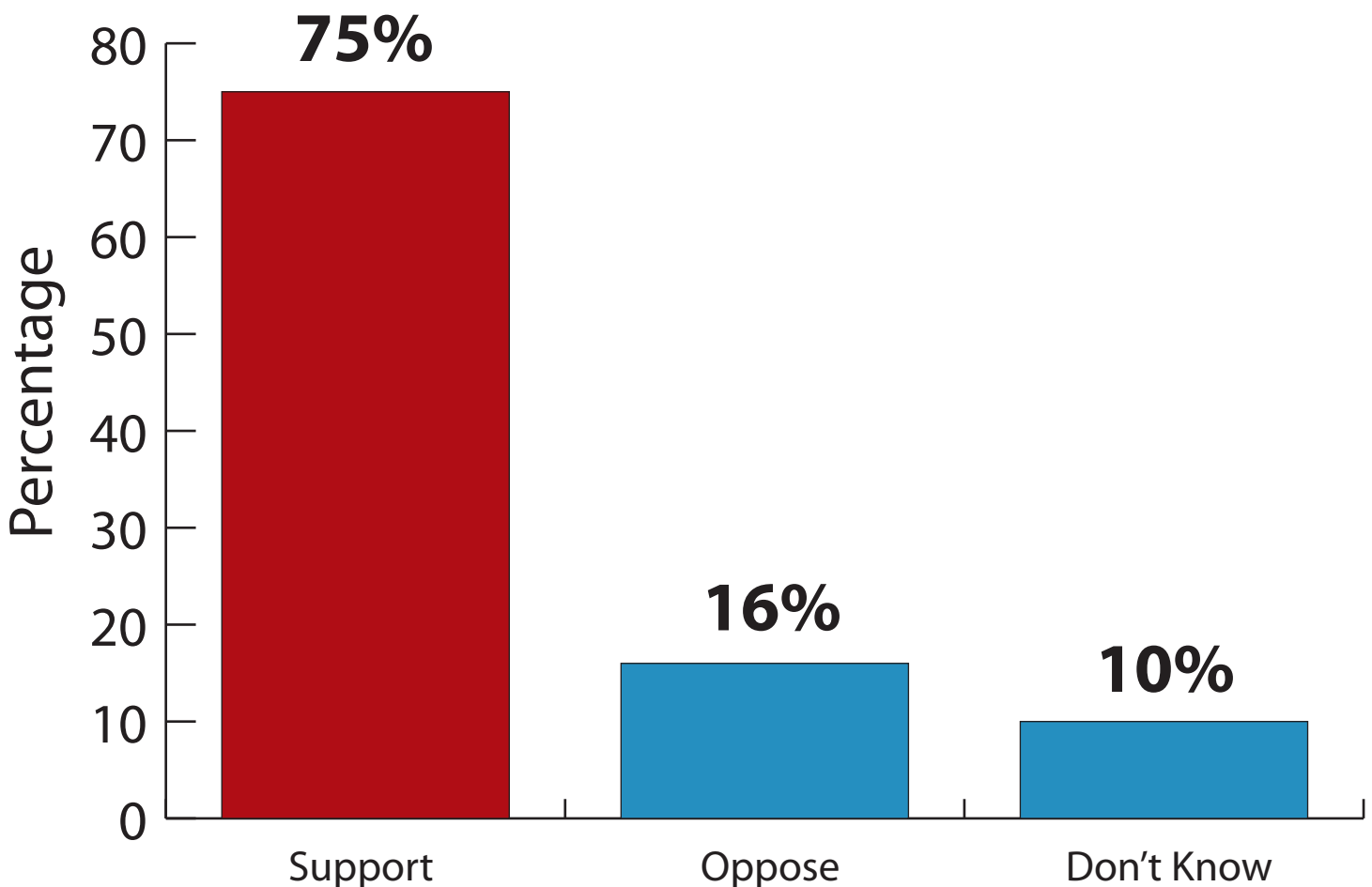
# Issues of Concern

*Q. Which of the following four issues best reflects the reason you are concerned about young Ontarians not being able to attend a publicly funded university or college in Ontario?*



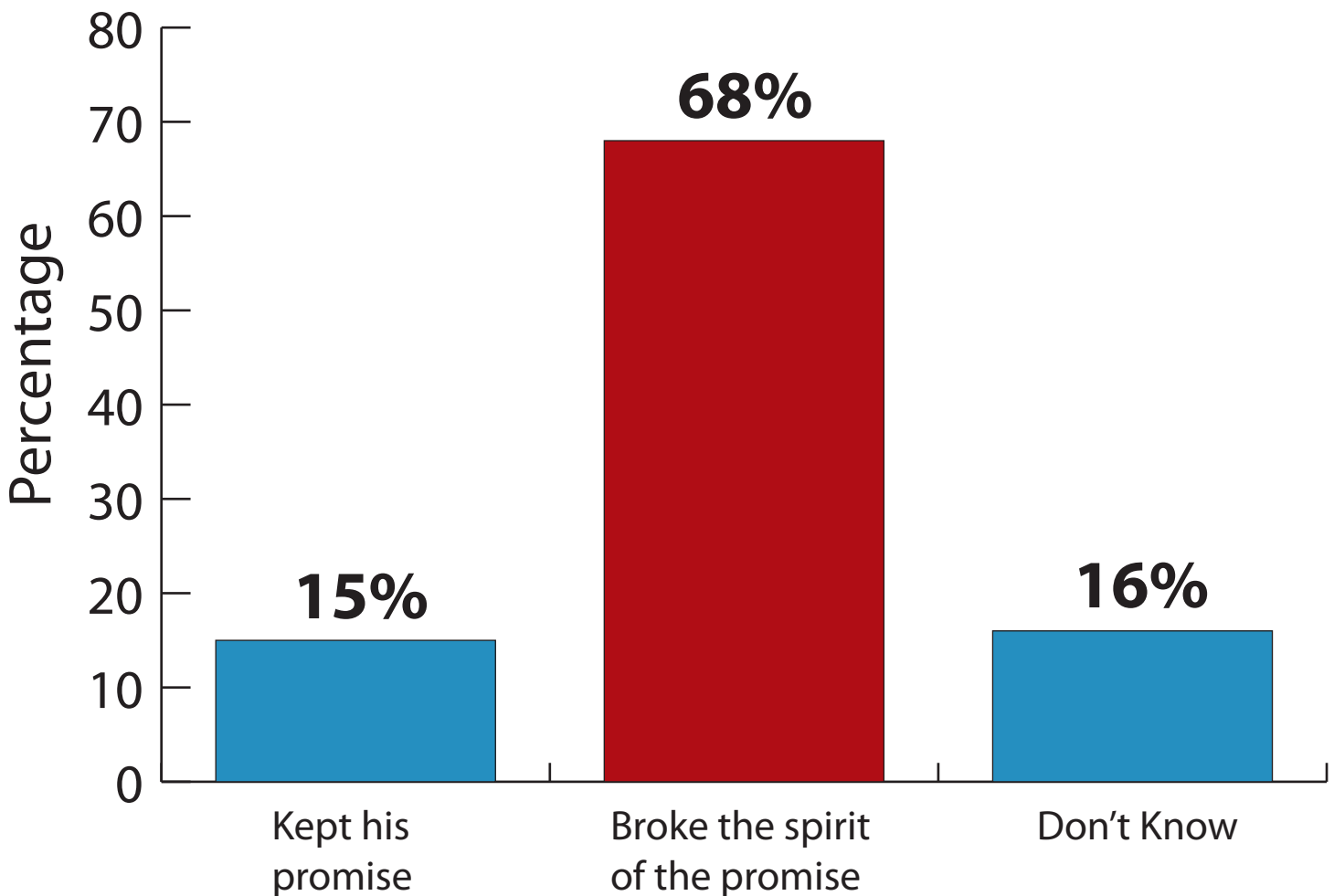
# Reduce Tuition Fees

# Broken Promise

*Q. As you may remember, Dalton McGuinty promised in the last election campaign to freeze tuition fees for at least two years. Dalton McGuinty did freeze tuition fees for two years, but then immediately announced tuition fee increases between 20% and 36% over the next four years. Based on what you know, would you say that Dalton McGuinty kept his promise or do you think he broke the spirit of the promise?*
